## Criteria\* for Level 1 Success

\* Criteria listed below quote the same criteria as described in the "W3C 2.0 Guidelines."

Text-equivalents are explicitly associated with non-text content, except when the non-text content is intended to create a specific sensory effect (such as music without words and visual art).

- An audio description of visual events is provided for audio-visual media.
    - Captions are provided for all significant dialogue and sounds in time-dependent material.
      - Descriptions and captions are synchronized with the events they represent.
  - 1. The following can be derived programmatically (for example, through a markup or data model) from the content without requiring user interaction:
    - a. Hierarchical elements and relationships, such as:
      - paragraphs
· lists
· headings
· associations between table cells
- b. Non-hierarchical relationships between elements such as:
  - cross-references and other relationships
- c. Emphasis or other formatting of specific words, phrases, and quotations

Any text that is presented over a background is electronically available so that it could be re-presented in a form that allows the text to be read against a plain background.

No level 1 success criteria for this guideline.

All of the functionality of the content, where the functionality or its outcome can be described in a sentence, is operable through a keyboard.

Content is designed so that time limits are not an essential part of interaction, or at least one of the following is true for each time limit:

- the user is allowed to deactivate the time limit or;
  - the user is allowed to adjust the time limit over a wide range which is at least ten times the length of the time limit
  - the user is warned before time expires, allowed to extend the time limit with a simple action
- or;
- the time limit is an important part of a real-time event (for example, a time limit on a live auction)
  - the time limit is part of an activity where the user is expected to be aware of the time limit

Content that violates General Flash Threshold or Red Flash Threshold is marked in way that the user can access prior to its appearance.

- metadata on page
- information in title (so search engine shows it)
- notification on page before provocative information is encountered

The natural language of the document as a whole can be identified by automated tools. The meaning of abbreviations and acronyms can be located.

Any extreme change of context (such as opening a new browser window) is implemented in a manner that can be programmatically identified.

Except where the site has documented that a specification was violated for backward compatibility or compatibility with assistive technology

- passed validity tests for the version of the technology in use (whether it be conforming to a schema, Document the specification),
- structural elements and attributes are used as defined in the specification.
